Voter registration was imputed from the November 2014 Current Population Survey Registration and Voting Supplement.
<b>Weighting</b>	The sample was weighted based on gender, age, race, education, 2012 and 2016 Presidential vote. The weights range from 0.09 to 5.328, with a mean of one and a standard deviation of 0.827.
